SHELSLEY WALSH

Visiting Shelsley Walsh for the Sprite 60th celebrations fulfilled a long-held ambition of mine. My father-in-law was a motoring enthusiast and as such he collected a modest library of motoring books including a motoring autobiography from the 1950s by Raymond Mays called 'Split Seconds'.

Raymond Mays was the top pre-war hillclimb and racing driver making his name initially with a pair of Brescia Bugattis that he modified for hill climbs along with long-term colleague Amherst Villiers. He latterly supercharged (a Villiers designed unit) what was to be called the 'White Riley', put twin wheels on the rear axle and blew away most of the opposition, although challenged by Hans Stuck in an Austro-Daimler who held the record for three years. The White Riley led to his most famous project the ERA series that did so well in the *voiturette* category of racing and that still can be seen competing in VSCC meetings. 'Split seconds' refers to the margin by which hill climbs are won and he won many of them including being the undisputed 'King' of Shelsley Walsh where he posted fastest time of the day and took new records at almost every occasion he competed there.

Over the years I have been to most of the motor racing venues in this country but never Shelsley, a venue so evocative in motoring memory that it was on my bucket list not the least in that it brings back memories of conversations with father-in-law about a period that has always fascinated me.

What follows is an excerpt from a contemporary book on Shelsley by pre-war motoring journalist C A N May. It hasn't changed and I can tick my box.

SHELSLEY!

Against a background of tall, dark, majestic trees, a narrow ribbon of road winds steeply up a hillside, twisting, at its steepest pitch, into a sharp left-right "S" bend. On the natural grandstands formed by the sloping banks at the roadside, and in the amphitheatres formed by clearings amongst the tall trees, a crowd of several thousand people waits expectantly.

Shelsley continued....

Away down at the foot of the hill—where there are orchards, dog kennels, hay stacked in Dutch barns and a black-and-white farmhouse—there comes, intermittently, a harsh, staccato noise, like the tearing of giant strips of calico.

Of a sudden the noise steadies, and takes on a more purposeful note. A voice comes over the loud-speaker installation, bells tinkle, a wave of excitement ripples through the crowd. The noise rises to a screaming crescendo, falls for a split second, and rises anew. Men with big brooms make a last defiant jab at ripples of loose grit on the corners of the S, and then crouch back against the banks at the roadside, while the crowd goes tense.

With a shattering roar a slim, streamlined projectile hurtles into view, swaying and lifting to the unevenness of the road surface, big section tyres scrabbling for grip. Shuddering slightly under the impact of powerful brakes, firmly applied, the sleek, graceful machine slows momentarily, on the apex of the first left-hand corner, while the driver's elbows shoot up and down like pistons as the steering-wheel is turned this way and that to hold the car to a level course. Yelping viciously as a lower gear goes home, revolution-counter needle swinging into the "red", the machine leaps forward again in a scatter of grit, and with a rising snarl of exhaust note drowning the plaudits of the crowd, goes away between the banks of the second corner, its passage marked by the lingering, sickly-sweet smell of "dope". (Alcohol-based fuel in case there was any doubt in your mind!)

Since 1905, the year in which The Midland Automobile Club first persuaded Mr. Montague C. H. Taylor, the then tenant of the Court House Farm, Shelsley Walsh, to sanction the use of the steep bridle path running up through his fields as the site for speed hill-climbs, many thousands of people have made the pilgrimage to this picturesquely sited, though somewhat inaccessible hill, rising, rather unexpectedly, from the heart of the Worcestershire hop-fields.

Naturally the extremely narrow, bumpy, gravel-surfaced track which was the scene of the first climb on August 12th, 1905, presented a very different picture from the much wider, metal-surfaced, stoutly fenced—though still a little bumpy—road on which latter-day drivers have steadily reduced the time for the fastest climb to a number of seconds less than half that recorded at the opening meeting.

MY MATE MIKE REFLECTS ON SHELSLEY WALSH

A friend, Mike Roe, often accompanies me on Healey trips and has done since I bought the car in 1991. He came along to the Shelsley Sprite 60 event and here is a page from his diary:

The morning's strong summer sun had driven the visitors into the small marquee at midday, and I sat in the front row facing the low, makeshift stage on which THE SOUTHERN BELLES were delivering their hour's performance - singing to the thin attendance in the warm, tented shade.

The three lady performers were dressed in the style of the Andrews Sisters, the famous American trio of the forties and fifties. They were a local trio, all on the wrong side of thirty and so not exactly in the youthful, slim-waisted 'Sisters' image. Their rather matronly figures were each dressed in the same knee-length bright red frocks with black belts around their thickening midriffs. Black shoes and black gloves and their bright red lipstick, matching the colour of their dress, and outrageous floppy hats completed their 'showbiz' appearance.

They sang and harmonised to the backing tracks on the sound recorder back stage and they delivered a good range of popular numbers from that jazz age, with many songs from the Andrews catalogue featuring in their lively performance, gyrating to the rhythmic pulse of the music with plenty of Southern gaiety in their gesticulations.

My eyes were fixed on the tallest of 'the belles', a good-looking, well-stacked blond and in my thoughts I imagined her transported in time to a sleazy, nineteen-forties New Orleans motel room lying on the bed in her underwear, smoking as she awaited the arrival of her lover and gazing out of the flyblown windows anticipating the lovemaking that lay ahead. I could even see, in my mind's eye, the ashtray beside the double bed with its red lipstickedbutts , and hear the electric ceiling fan lazily stirring the warm smoked-filled air above the bed.

I enjoyed their performance that ended with a favourite number – 'a full-on' Chattanooga Choo Choo.
