An example is the front cover photograph. I trawled through my computer and found the rather nice photo of John Raybould's car but, for the life of me I can't remember when the photo was taken or where.



MORE TECHNICAL TIPS FROM DAVE HOLMAN

Whilst tackling a couple of fiddly jobs recently I was reminded how frustrating it is to have a floppy universal joint in the socket set department. There is a little trick which may help, I use an "o" ring to slip over the joint which increases the friction to hold it in place initially but still allows full movement. You have to find a suitable size and thickness of course but it has to be a snug fit over the middle of the joint and ideally the thickness needs to be a tight fit between the two yokes. The stretch in the "o" ring will enable it to fit around the yokes as hopefully the pictures will show.

For **Drive it Day on the 23**rd **April**, there is a charity fun run around the south of Essex, starting from the RHS gardens at Hyde Hall, Chelmsford, refreshments available here, then a 50 mile drive to finish at the Royal Gunpowder Mills, Waltham Abbey. IN SEARCH OF A WEATHERPROOF 100

Dave Holman tackles the perennial Healey problem....

The way my sidescreens fit there is still a bit of a gap at the front bottom corner where the material curves out to sit on the door, I have used some self adhesive sponge strip trimmed to fit in the triangular gap that is exposed, this works but I don't think the adhesive bond will last very long on the textured material so will be monitored over time.





I have also used some very soft sponge on the back of the pillar and the side of the shroud where the door closes up to it. Unfortunately this mod doesn't look very pretty at the moment but I am sure that a bit of repositioning will improve things.

The modifications haven't yet been tested exhaustively but I did get to take it out for a 45 minute drive in pretty heavy rain and it all seemed to be quite effective, the carpets stayed dry in that time, as did my glasses. The seal under the screen still allows it to be lowered and I don't think it looks too obvious, a possible problem may be that a little water still gets behind the original seal so it will be prudent to lower the screen after a wet run just to dry out the corners. All the seals used are available from "Woolies" at Market Deeping.

MORE ABOUT RALPH SLEIGH

Last month's Mutterings carried an article about the motoring exploits of Giles, the famous Daily Express cartoonist. His navigator was Ralph Sleigh:

Ralph Sleigh (on left in the photo below), was an ex-Squadron Leader, R.A.F., from Hitcham, near Ipswich, and was Eastern Counties Representative of a firm of paint manufacturers. Peter Jopling, his co-driver on his long-distance adventures was an ex-Major in the King's African Rifles, from Merston, near Chichester. They first met through an advertisement Sleigh inserted in a daily newspaper when he was seeking companions for his Trans-African 1948 trip.

They completed the journey from England in 24 days 2 hours 50 minutes, smashing the previous best time on record by no less than 7 days 19 hours 10 minutes and had also broken the Algiers to Cape Town "record" by 3 days 20 hours 55 minutes.

In 1948 Sleigh and Jopling drove an Austin A70 Hampshire Saloon with only two modifications - special auxiliary tanks mounted on the roof and seats designed to let down as beds. But the extra equipment carried in the car weighed slightly more than half a ton - a further testimony, were any needed, to the sturdiness of the A70. In 1950 they were to use a Wolseley 6/80 for a similar trip.

The distance overland from Algiers to the Cape is 10,300 miles – four thousand miles further than the sea route because no road existed down the West Coast of Africa.



The full details of their adventures can be found in Savage Sahara, written by Ralph Sleigh on his return.

We all warmed up with the soup, and chatted over the sandwiches, discussing plans for outings and events in 2017 - very much hoping we get a nice fine, dry summer.








WINTER DRAWERS ON!

I assume everyone has been beavering away out in the garage preparing their cars for the wonderful summer of Healeying that awaits. During this time it is nice to have a good look round and to this end I like to get the car up on four axle stands, which gives a chance to lie underneath and have a good look round [not as good as walking in under a proper lift but as good as most of us will get].

Jacking a Healey up to this height can be a bit tedious so to make life a little easier I have made a set of four small ramps from 6" x 3" timber. I used some timber I had surplus to requirements and made them around 600mm long with a ramp over about 200mm of that length. Driving onto these means I can get a decent sized trolley jack under the car enabling one lift at each end to get to full axle stand height.





To enable jacking on the centre-line of the car I also have a sturdy piece of timber that I have put a groove in along the length to accommodate the welded seam of the front cross-member, this spreads the lifting load and should eliminate the pushed-up cross-member syndrome. If you don't have suitable saws to make these things up I am sure a local timber supplier would be able to help.

The height of these ramps is also sufficient to do a quick oil change without having to resort to jack and axle stands.

Tips for winter from Dave, continued....

Once up on the stands you have the chance to check the wheels, tyres and brakes as well as a look round for any evidence of rust creeping up on you. If you plan on not using the car for a while it is good to leave it on the stands to give the tyres a chance to remain round, otherwise mark the tyre with a bit of chalk at the bottom and roll it about so it isn't sitting on the same part of the tyre all the time, I also increase the tyre pressure to help stop flat spots but obviously if you do that, leave a note on the steering wheel to remind you to set them to the correct pressure before you drive off.

Whilst on the subject of wooden aids, I have also made some small blocks to fit under the wiper arms to raise the blades off the screen, this helps keep the

rubber in its intended shape.





As always I never seem to make enough effort to get out into the garage and get all the jobs done so I will inevitably have a spring and summer of fettling to relieve the boredom in between the events and shows! I am planning on visiting the Donington Historic Festival this year as I haven't had a chance before, and of course there are plenty of Eastern Centre events that I need to catch up on as I won't be doing quite so much "Old Healey" stuff. I am hoping to make the famed Battlesbridge show this year as we won't be away that weekend for the first time in many years.

Hopefully we will get a chance to say Hi at sometime during the year but whatever you do, enjoy your motoring.

RESTORING THE DREAM - part 2 from Angela Bonner

As a result of standing outside until she came back to England, which took about six weeks, and damage incurred in the accident itself, plus then four years outside but under wraps, the interior was in a sorry state. I had never liked the tan brown upholstery anyway, and the Heritage certificate quotes blue, so now the entire interior is 'off the shelf' navy blue apart from the seats. These have been specially re-covered in the slightly lighter 'midnight blue' which doesn't have the, to my mind, greyish overtones of stock navy leather.

The engine block and other metal parts which were normally painted are now in the original dark green, including the rocker cover. This had been chromed, but repairing damage also damaged the chrome finish.

More wiring and other engine bay components are being attached, suddenly we have a car rather than a shell and an awful lot of bits.



A completely new wiring loom is being fitted, I don't believe in taking chances with electrical stuff, and some of the instruments have been away for refurbishing. Rumour has it that there is no such thing as an accurate Healey fuel gauge, but at least we will have tried!

As soon as the threaded wheel hubs were sorted out - there seems to be different thicknesses of metal used sometimes, who knows why, so what with that, and getting the right handed, left handed supply sorted this took longer than hoped. The car was now put onto 'slave wheels' to preserve the final ones from any possible damage so the engine and gearbox could be fitted, and I felt we were now making visible progress.
